14. Burlington Glass Works – The studio of internationally acclaimed glass artist Mark Matthews. You may have a chance to see the artist at work as well as view and purchase his one-of-a-kind creations.

15. Broom Shop – Watch our talented broom makers create functional and beautiful brooms.

16. Festival Barn – Group lunchroom and event activity area.

17. Brush Creek Pottery – Resident potter Mark Nafziger creates traditional and contemporary pottery in his timber-framed studio. His studio houses both the production area and a showroom where his work is for sale.

18. The Nature Center– See our exhibit on *Exploring our Ecosystem* – Soil, Water, Plants and Wildlife in a fun format for all ages!

19. Water-powered Grist Mill – As the water rushes over the water wheel, our miller shows how corn is turned into corn meal.

20. "Erie Express" Train Station – Drop off only. Pick up the train at the Elmira Depot (#39).

21. Natives & Newcomers - 1803-1839 – Learn about the lives of the Native Americans and European traders who lived in this area at the time of Ohio's statehood. Visit the authentic wigs and trading post.

Pioneer Settlement - 1834-1908

22. Lauber Settlement – Visit the rough constructed log building and a covered wagon similar to those used by the Lauber party settlers when they arrived in 1834 after their long journey from Europe.

23. Log Schoolhouse – This is a representation of an 1840s era school.

24. The Witmer-Roth Home – Original home of Anna Sauder Witmer Roth. c.1844.

25. Eicher Cabin – The original home of Jacob & Barbara Eicher who arrived in Fulton County in the 1850s, about the same time the railroad made travel to the area much easier.

26. The Jail – Originally built in the late 1860s, this unusually constructed jail housed Northwest Ohio's early lawbreakers.

27. Peter Stuckey Farm – An 1870s era farm where Peter & Catherine (Yoder) Stuckey lived and worked. The Peter Stuckey farm includes a home, summer kitchen, wagon shop and barn with animals.

29. Holdeman Church – Original Mennonite church from Pettisville. Horse & Buggy ride (*there is an additional fee to ride the buggy*)

30. Sawmill – Open during special events.

1920s Main Street

31. Livery – The livery was an essential business, serving as a “parking garage and gas station” for farmers’ horses when coming into town. It also provided horses & buggies to rent when needed and a place for town residents to stable their horses.

32. Dr. McGuffin's Office – Dr. McGuffin built this office in nearby Pettisville in 1911. It features many of the medical instruments used by country doctors.

33. Rich Auto Dealership and Gas Station – This reconstructed building highlights the sale and repair of the automobile, one of the most iconic inventions of the 20th century.

D. Founder's Hall – Beautiful exhibit center: wedding, conference, etc.

E. Doughbox Bakery – Homemade baked goods and specialty coffees & drinks.

F. Campground – 87 sites with bathhouse, splash pad, playground & more.

G. Sauder Heritage Inn – 98 guest rooms, indoor pool and hot tub near Great Oak Tree

H. Sauder Store & Outlet – Sauder's line of home & office furniture

I. Little Lake Erie – Fishing available to Inn & campground guests

J. Picnic Shelter/Gazebo – Can be reserved for your family to enjoy

34. Ohio Farm Bureau Office – Founded in 1919, some of the organization's early goals included providing electric service to rural areas, crop insurance and helping pass legislation to assist farmers. Stop by this historic office to learn more about the role of the farm bureau in the early 1920s.

35. Farmers & Merchants State Bank – This beautiful replica of an original downtown Archbold bank offers insights into the flourishing economic history of our country before the devastating financial Crash of 1929.

36. Schuck Jewelry Store – More than necklaces, rings, and watches, the jewelry store of the 1920s offered a wide array of high-end items including China sets, porcelain, eyewear, tea services, flatware, cuff link sets, cameras, electric lamps, and much more.

37. Stotzer Hardware Store – Evolved from the general mercantile store and harness shop, the 1920s hardware store offered tools and materials for almost any home or farmstead need.

38. Okuley Barbershop – In the 1900s, the barbershop was one of the social centers of the community and provided a place to spruce up from your travels, get a shave or a haircut. Modern public restrooms are included behind this building.

39. Elmira Train Depot – Trains first appeared in Northwest Ohio in the 1850s. This depot showcases the important role of the rail system. **Train Ride** – Catch a ride on our train! This fun-filled ride takes you around the perimeter of the Historic Village and stops at the Erie Express Train Station. *The train is free to our guests.*

40. Community Plaza and Bandstand – The community plaza and bandstand adjacent to the depot served as a sense of community pride. Original salvaged bricks from downtown Archbold were used to create the plaza at the depot. A traditional bandstand near the plaza hosts special programming and events.

41. Caboose – Once a vital part of the railroad, the caboose was the last car on the freight train and provided shelter for the crew.

42. Fire Station – Featuring a 1923 Ford Model T fire truck and an 1893 hand pumper, Fire Station #1 on Main Street offers an inside look at this transitional period of firefighting in the United States.

43. Wiederkehr Clothing – Moving away from an all-in-one shopping experience, in the 1920s, the Dry Goods store focused on ready-made items and sewing necessities for making clothing at home. Browse off-the-rack clothing, fancy linens, 1927 Butterick patterns and fashion magazines, buttons, stockings, shoes, and more.

44. Hub Grocery Store – Depicting a “green grocer”, this shop will offer a look at what household staples were commonly sought after to meet everyday needs beyond meat and fish. These goods included vegetables, cheeses, and pre-packaged foods.

45. Theater – Engaging local people of all ages, silent films were the epitome of modern entertainment in the 1920s. Stop by to take a peek at what's playing on the big screen! Beyond silent films, this space may be utilized by the public for special events and conferences.

46. Speakeasy – With Prohibition in full swing, secret illegal pop up bars known as Speakeasies provided an opportunity to enjoy drink and jazz. Our Speakeasy offers special events, programming and tastings.

47. Main Street Confections – Indulge your sweet tooth in delectable 1920s era candy brands including, Baby Ruth, Boston Baked Beans, Charleston Chews, Chuckles, Dubble Bubble, Dum Dums, Fruit Slices, Goobers, Sixlets and more!

48. Restrooms

49. Soda Fountain/Pharmacy – Come and sip a cherry phosphate along with ice cream and other snacks at the Soda Fountain.

50. District 16 Schoolhouse – This original one-room school is typical of the type of rural schools attended by children in Northwest Ohio.

51. The 1920s Grime Homestead – Experience the beginning of the modern age in this 1920's farmhouse. Visit farm animals in the barnyard.

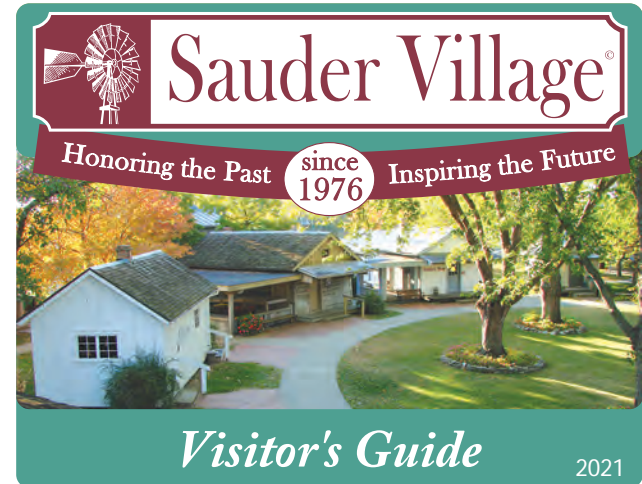

Guide to the Historic Village

A Living Reminder of Black Swamp Heritage

Your experience at Sauder Village will cover many time periods and highlight many points of interest. The following list will help identify each building's focus.

- Erie's Farm Shop** - This shop, originally located on the Sauder Family Farm before moving here, is where Sauder Woodworking began when Erie Sauder started working with wood at the age of 16.
- Sauder Cabinet Shop** - Paying tribute to the importance of woodworking in this region's development, this shop displays a unique collection of woodworking tools.
- The Basket Shop** - Talented basket makers are at work each day creating a variety of unique baskets.
- Craft Shop** - Watch as crafters blend skill and creativity in hands-on craft making. Woodworking, Rug Hooking and other handmade craft demonstrations throughout the season.
- The Tinsmith's Shop** - In this shop, reproductions of 1700s -1800s traditional tinware are created.
- Black Swamp Cooperage** - Watch and learn as our coopers use tools and methods that have changed little over the centuries to make buckets and barrels.
- Anna's Spinning Shop** - This shop showcases the tradition of spinning fibers into yarn.
- Barbara's Weaving Shop** - Skilled weavers turn threads and rags into beautiful creations on our barn frame loom.
- St. Mark's Lutheran Church** - This church from the early 1900s depicts the religious life of the German Lutherans who helped to settle this region.
- Restrooms**
- a. Threads of Tradition Quilt Shop** - Thousands of bolts of top quality fabric, kits, books, tools, notions, gifts and hand-quilting demonstrations.
- b. Museum Building** - Visit our new exhibits and learn about the Sauder companies, grain, agriculture, the Great Black Swamp and more.
- Lauber's General Store & Herb Shop** - This store brings back the era when you did all of your shopping in one spot. Browse through our wide selection of collectibles, 'penny' candy, hard-to-find kitchen items, toys, herbs, teas and more.
- The W.O. Taylor Printing Office** - This shop is a reproduction of the community of Archbold's first newspaper office. See how printing was done in the early 1900s.
