Your field trip is scheduled during the week Sauder Village is celebrating women in history who made an impact on improving women's rights.

Below are the places at Sauder Village your students will discover these selected Women's stories. Our historical interpreters will provide a brief synopsis of their significant place in history.

The Log School celebrates **Lucretia Coffin Mott**. Lucretia Coffin Mott was involved in the early part of the women's movement and was a strong advocate for ending slavery.

The Witmer-Roth home celebrates **Susan B. Anthony**. Susan B. Anthony was committed to fighting for rights for workers, equal pay for equal work, to ending slavery and to limiting alcoholic drinking.

The Eicher Cabin celebrates **Mary Ann Shadd Cary**. Mary Ann Shadd Cary was an American activist, writer, teacher, and lawyer.

The Stuckey Homestead celebrates **Elizabeth Cady Stanton**. Elizabeth Cady Stanton was one of the foremost women's rights activists and philosophers of the 19th century.

The W.O. Taylor Printing Office celebrates **Ida B. Wells**. Ida B. Wells is best known for being a prominent journalist, civil rights activist, and feminist.

The Wiederkehr Dry Goods Store celebrates **Annette Kellerman**. Annette Kellerman was a professional swimmer, writer, and actress both on stage and silent films.

The Farmers and Merchants State Bank celebrates **Maggie Lena Walker**. Maggie Lena Walker achieved national prominence as a businessperson and community leader.

The Shuck Jewelry Store celebrates **Frances Ellen Watkins Harper**. Frances Ellen Watkins Harper was a poet, essayist, and novelist often writing on civil rights, slavery, and suffrage.

The Grime Home celebrates **Alice Paul**. Alice Paul was a prominent activist and leader of the most confrontational wing of the woman's suffrage movement
